## FROM THE HEAD OF SCHOOL ...

I recently attended a panel discussion of Critical Issues in Urban Education sponsored by the College of Education and Public Service at St. Louis University. Certainly, urban environment issues differ from their suburban or rural counterparts. However, even with this shared commonality, the issues and opinions are as varied and unique as our students. Principal Kevin Lee from Loyola Academy brought up a consideration I have heard often: Since we no longer live in the agrarian environment from which our current school system was structured, why do we still maintain its schedule? Given the conditions of our country today, why do school days end at three; and the school year run for only nine and a half months? It's a valid question. The majority of children today are part of a dual income family or single parent family. Scheduling after school or in the summer can be a real hassle. Summer can be a real inconvenience - for us adults.

Since the agrarian schedule was created by adults, we certainly can change it to better suit our needs today. Frankly, that would be easier than the alternative. However, a more evolved approach begs us to consider the bigger picture. One size does not fit all - in any element of education. In fact, this is arguably the most significant reason why schools struggle. For some students, extra time in the classroom may be a real gift. Hopefully, they are in schools where the community has a shared vision and a leader like Kevin at Loyola. At The Soulard School, we embrace all the people, places and experiences from which we learn and grow. Eleven ten (1110) Victor and 2116 South 13th Street are two of those places; friends, teachers and administrators are some of those people; and school days are many of those experiences. Summer is an experience from which we learn and grow as well.

This year has been terrific. Our nautical inspiration has carried us full circle. Like all great seamen, we have worked together as crew to launch the ship, hoist the masts, and raise the sails. When we had to navigate the course, we were like those in movies... with agility, speed, strength, and coordination-adjusting and readjusting. Then there is that moment, a pause, and the pay off - our enormous sail captures the wind. First, there is the definitive sound - whoomp (May 23rd - last day); high fives and hugs (Ice Cream Social); and then we sit back and enjoy the breeze (Art \& Garden Festival.)

The sea is vast and endless. Enjoy the lazy days of summer. Act like a kid - or if you can't - then at least, let your kid be a kid.
