FROM THE HEAD OF SCHOOL ...

More than 240 people shared in this year's Annual Feast of Thanks. Four years earlier, the Trinity Lutheran Church community generously allowed us to use the very same space to celebrate our first Feast with 40 people. Of all the unique elements of our school, **the Feast is one of my favorites**.

The Thanksgiving holiday in American culture has always been associated with gratitude for the harvest and celebrated on the last Thursday in November. However, the dates and location of the "first Thanksgiving" are a source of modest contention. Similarly, there is evidence that the cultural celebration of Christmas on December 25th, may actually have be chosen to coincide with the winter solstice; and is celebrated by Christians in honor of the birth of Jesus, though not necessarily his actual date of birth. In general, actual dates and times seem far less important than the purpose of the celebration. In fact, prior to 1750, our country observed a Julian calendar with eleven more days per year and a new year beginning in each March rather than the Gregorian calendar used today (and more commonly used by neighboring nations then.) Other significant religious and cultural celebrations such as Hanukkah and Kwanzaa occur and are celebrated after Thanksgiving, before the start of a New Year.

The Season of Thanks always precedes the Season of Giving. This is in contradiction to much of our materialist culture where gratitude comes after receiving something. While the Season of Thanks is clearly an expression of gratitude for a bountiful harvest (and bountiful blessings), it is not coincidental that the Season of Giving immediately follows.

We all recognized this when we shared **Melody Beattie's** words at the Feast of Thanks:

Gratitude unlocks the fullness of life. It turns what we have into enough, and more. It turns denial into acceptance, chaos to order, and confusion to clarity. It can turn a meal into a feast, a house into a home, a stranger into a friend. Gratitude makes sense of our past, brings peace for today, and creates a vision for tomorrow. STUDIO UPDATE | Over the past month in studio, the students have finished up the **construction of their clay sculptures** and assisted in creating festive decorations for the Feast of Thanks. After the sculptures return from being fired in the kiln, the students will proceed to paint the clay with dots to replicate the look of the glass mosaics on the Niki de Saint Phalle sculptures. In preparation of this, we will also take a look at the painting styles of Oceanic Artwork from the Pacific Islands and Australia. Much of the art from this region features colorful patterns along with dot painting.

In addition to working with clay, we are also discussing the concept of **using letters or words in artwork.** Some of the younger classes completed a project using their initials as the foundation for a repeating pattern. This experiment displayed how a letter is composed of lines to make a shape and can be used to create an abstract pattern. Other classes used the concept of a word web to create a drawing combining language and imagery. 2

NURSERY UPDATE | Here is a brief update about the exciting and fun things that have been going on at the nursery these past few months. In the toddler room, we have been studying and **learning about many nature-related themes**, including insects, fall/autumn, forest animals, and camping. Throughout our studies, we read many books on these topics, learned some new songs, and participated in a variety of activities related to the themes. Some of the activities have included **nature walks**, **digging for worms** and bugs outside, **learning about composting** with a worm bin, examining plastic bugs with magnifying glasses, and exploring with leaves, sticks, sand, and dirt at the sensorial table. We also **turned our dramatic play area into a campsite**, complete with tents, a picnic table, nature puppets, flashlights, scarves, hats, gloves, etc. The toddler friends really enjoyed playing with the **flashlights** and it was often a favorite activity during choice time. The only thing missing in our campsite was a campfire, but we still **roasted marshmallows** anyway (pretend, of course)! The past two weeks, the kids had the opportunity to taste and explore with different fall fruits, such as squash, pumpkin, and pomegranate. They **carved the pumpkin** and counted the seeds, tasted the yummy pomegranate, and did a painting activity with decorative gourds and Indian corn. Over the course of the next month, we plan to spend time learning more about **animals and hibernation**, as well as different types of weather.
