Join fellow TSS parents for a discussion of The Case Against Homework.

The time our children spend doing homework has skyrocketed in recent years. Parents spend countless hours cajoling their kids to complete such assignments often without considering whether they serve any worthwhile purpose. The truth, according to Sara Bennett and Nancy Kalish, is that there is almost no evidence that homework helps elementary school students achieve academic success and little more that it helps older students. Yet the nightly burden is taking a serious toll on America's families. It robs children of the sleep, play, and exercise time they need for proper physical, emotional, and neurological development. In The Case Against Homework, Bennett and Kalish draw on academic research, interviews with educators, parents, and kids, and their own experience as parents and successful homework reformers to offer detailed advice to frustrated parents. You'll learn Which assignments advance learning and which are time-wasters, how to set priorities when your child comes home with an over-stuffed backpack, how to talk and write to teachers and school administrators in persuasive, non-confrontational ways, and how to rally other parents to help restore balance in your children's lives.

homesteader cornbread

- 1 1/2 cups cornmeal 2 1/2 cups
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 tbsp baking powder
- 1 tsp salt
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 2 eggs, beaten 1/2 cup canola oil

- 1. Preheat oven to 400. Grease an 8x8 inch pan or cast iron skillet.
- 2. In a small bowl, combine cornmeal and milk; let stand for 5 minutes.
- 3. In a large bowl, whisk together flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Mix in the cornmeal mixture, eggs and oil just until moistened. Pour batter into prepared pan.
- 4. Bake in preheated oven for 30-35 minutes or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean.
