

Integrity and respect are two words you see and hear a lot at The Soulard School. Classrooms include spaces for peace and recognize peacemakers, and we have a Teaching Peace parade each April. Respect for students is shown through their opportunity to participate in their own curriculum. Even the classroom layouts reflect the integral nature of learning, with tables rather than individual desks, arranged in circles or clusters rather than rows.

As a parent, I find one of the most impressive aspects of our school's curriculum to be its inclusion of social and emotional development. Here it is treated as importantly in a child's education as math and literacy. There is a recognition that, just as subjects are not compartmentalized, neither is learning itself. Learning happens inside (and outside) a classroom full of different individuals who are also learning, quite frankly, how to relate and get along.

October provided several opportunities for students to explore this topic, with their parents as well as their peers. Early in the month, some families attended a back-toschool workshop with Rachel Simmons (author of Odd Girl Out), which focused on empowering girls to cultivate healthy relationships and deal with conflict effectively. Later in the month, all elementary students attended Metro Theater's performance of Tomato Plant Girl, a play that directly addressed bullying in friendships.

With the recent political campaigning aired daily on our tv's and radios, and news headlines of bullying at school surfacing because of its heartbreaking consequences, I am reminded of how important it is for us to cultivate an awareness of relational aggression and its effects, even in our wonderful school that teaches tolerance. As a librarian, I know that books can be a useful and safe portal into dialogue about emotions and relations,

especially for young children who are just learning how to name their feelings. Here is a short list of suggested reading for families. Accepting differences, finding the confidence to be yourself, and conflict resolution are at the heart of these titles.

classroom happenings

quietude notes



The children in the Quietude Room share a yoga pose each morning during our meeting. We are building quite a collection of poses so we began to practice yoga in the Richter Room as well. After a challenging session filled with stories and stretching Indya, Abby, Thais, Hazel and Naomi played a silly yoga game where we lay on our friend's tummy and laugh.

strings notes



We are fiddling along towards our holiday concert in string class. Students should be working on those songs during their weekly practice. The Mums have been very excited to have violins, and they are almost ready to make music. The Enigma and Alchemy classes have been working on their concert material. In the next few weeks in the Alchemy class we will learn about different instruments and how they make sound. I have introduced some civil war era songs to the Mosaic class to compliment their study of the civil war. In the next few weeks we will be learning about what type of music was written and popular in that time.

Soulard School classes have been applying their collective knowledge of "How to think like an artist" in various directions over the last few weeks.

The Mosaic class (4/5/6) is exploring concepts of "A Surreal Life in Missouri". Students are creating artworks influenced by famous historical paintings of Missouri artists such as Bingham and Benton, while inserting modern day details that reflect their life in Missouri. I have been encouraging students to insert photographs of themselves, as well as images of their everyday environment. At home you can encourage your child to look through photographs to bring in for this project. Please keep in mind photographs will be cut and collaged. This class will also be taking a trip to the Saint Louis Art Museum to see the work of Bingham, Benton, and the special exhibit of Joe lones.

studio connections

The Alchemists (2/3) are exploring patterns and repetition and how art is influenced by mathematics. We are studying the tesselations of MC Escher, and creating our own. Students have been designing their own totally unique motifs, which will be cut out of multi- colored patterned fabric. At home, encourage your child to look for repeated patterns. I am also asking students to "up-cycle" by bringing in a patterned fabric for this project if at all possible: an old t-shirt, old clothes, table cloth...

The Enigma class has been creating their own mythical creatures with all kinds of special powers. In the coming weeks we will be taking a field trip to the Kemper Museum at Washington University to view the works of Rivanne Nueschwander. We will be studying in depth her exhibit of constellations. During Studio, kids in this class will be creating their own galaxy of constellations, while designing one very special constellation for their mythical creature to call home.

And **the Mum's (Kindergarden)** have been studying the science and art of food. We will be making art from a beautiful still life of baked goods, as well as making dyes from the foods we eat. As a class we will be batiking banners and using our handmade dyes for coloring.

This week all classes have been creating "Sur-real" oil pastel designs of a fall still life. These beautiful drawings will become centerpieces for everyone to see at the Feast of Thanks!


