alchemy notes


We have just begun a free program with Junior Achievement in the Alchemy class. Every Wednesday, our teacher/ volunteer, Terry Perkins, comes to our classroom to lead a lesson related to city functions. So far, we have learned how city planners divide an area into zones based on the function of the land. There are industrial, business, residential, multipurpose, farming, and hospital zones that make up a city and its' surrounding land. We were able to directly apply this new learning to our land project.

Land for Sale!
The Alchemy class is currently involved in a land project, in which they will be able to purchase land and later build something for their emerging mock community. The land project idea blossomed from our study of Plymouth Rock, in which we learned how the first settlers designed their community. With this foundational interest, we presented the students with the idea through a topographical map. Using the map, we discussed what kind of land-forms our land would have and began a discussion concerning what a community needs to thrive. Here's the catch, they would first have to save money to purchase land and then later, save again to purchase their building of interest. Through this project, the students in Alchemy are not only learning about communities, but are also learning how to earn, save, and spend money wisely. As we did last year, this trimester our parent/teacher conferences will be student/parent/teacher conferences, emphasis on STUDENT. This is a natural connection from our approach with our students where they are expected to have responsibility in their role in their school community. This experience becomes a new bridge of communication for all the individuals responsible for a student's education, including the student.

As part of their responsibility in their work, they are asked to be reflective about their own learning -not just to learn, but to think about their learning. In their work, students are asked to reflect on and collect documentation of their own learning in portfolios. This is modeled by the teacher in the younger grades to create more autonomy in the older grades. In these conferences, the students will use conference forms they have completed with their teacher, and use their artifacts in their portfolio to frame the conversation about their work, learning, and process. In these forms, students have reflected (with varying degrees of teacher input appropriate to their grade level) on their interests, strengths, challenges, and goals, both academic and personal.

When you arrive at your scheduled conference, please use the first 15 minutes to read the report with or to your child. Remember to use a strengths-based approach, always begin with the successes because how, why and when a child is successful holds the key to the challenges.

MCU has worked hard to initiate Senate Bill 162, which has been introduced in the Missouri State Senate. The group invited representatives from the Soulard School to accompany them as they head to Jefferson City to meet with legislators to discuss the bill. Mosaic students Iris Redmond, Isabel Sherman and Paige Waskow will travel to Jeff City on March 8 to learn first hand the process of a bill becoming a law.
