CONNECTION

Connection; much meaning and significance in one single

word. Brene Brown, author of Daring Greatly, defines connection as, "the energy that is created between people when they feel seen, heard, and valued: when they can give and receive without judgement." She goes on to then define belonging as, "the innate human desire to be part of something larger than us." At the beginning of each school year and throughout, it is important to us that our students begin to feel not only connected to each other and their classroom teacher, but also to begin to feel a sense of belonging within our school. Part of what makes our school unique, in my opinion, is that connection is in everything we do. From connecting school subjects to real world applications, to connecting with our neighborhoods and families in meaningful and creative ways. Before the school year began, the staff came together to get connected by participating in a common experience. We began professional development with an amazing race where teachers worked together in teams to achieve common goals. One of the goals was to take pictures of a set number of letters, using found items in the environment. When the teams returned they looked at the individual letters and realized they spelled one single word; connection.

Additionally, we strive to help parents and families not only feel connected to the school, but to each other. Coming together as volunteers with a common goal to better your child's learning environment, in whatever way that might be, often fosters that feeling of belonging. Sharing stories of growth, milestones, or simple parenting tips (even in quick conversations in the hallways) with each other builds connections that may last a lifetime.

When children come to our school every day, it is our collective responsibility to help them feel connected. We listen, we encourage them to voice their thoughts and feelings, and we show them that they are valued by encouraging them to be active participants in their own learning. It is our hope that they, in turn, develop a sense of belonging to something bigger; a place where everyone is heard, accepted, and valued. The place where they spend so much of their time and energy should matter, and we want the children to feel that they are so connected that they leave a mark on the school that stays long after they do.






HARVEST FESTIVAL | Soulard

classroom notes



CASTLES | In studying about castles, we learned about the importance of moats. We created a hands-on learning experience by forming our own moat in our sand box (above). Children built a sand castle and then dug a trench around it. We then filled it with water and saw how a real moat works! We also added a moat to our Pre-K castle (below).

Last week, our class worked diligently to get the <u>castle painted</u> and ready for what was to come next. This week, we glued bricks on to our castle, cut out windows and doors, created a drawbridge, and <u>designed our own flags</u> to adorn the castle with. Be sure to peek in to the Collage Studio and check out our class castle!

Our most exciting event of the school year (so far) was a <u>royal visit from the Queen!</u> Her name was Queen Signy of Saxony (a cast member of the St. Louis Renaissance Faire). As the children interviewed her, she shared a lot of information with us about her kingdom. We were able to see (and touch!) a real knight's gauntlet, swords and crossbows. Thanks, Queen Signy, for coming to visit our classroom!











VOLCANOES | This year in second grade we are taking time to explore volcanoes and all that comes along with them. We traveled through the earth's crust via videos, books, and pictures, and explored the earth's mantle, outer core, and inner core. Once we learned about all of the different layers, we popped back up through the crust to explore the different types of rocks that we could find there. We became scientist and explored the rocks in our own

school garden, created our rocks in our classroom, and were even lucky enough to have many different specimens of rock brought to our classroom to observe and discuss. Our exploration of the crust, including our rock study, brought us back to volcanoes. We are going to begin to take a closer look at the parts of a volcano, the different types of volcanoes, and where we find them. There is so much to learn through our study of volcanoes and we are looking forward to becoming Soulard School's volcano experts!







classroom notes



MAP INVESTIGATION | Map investigation has been the highlight of our subject studies in the Enigma class. We began exploring maps by viewing different types and creating our own vocabulary regarding similarities and differences within these maps. We created map booklets to highlight this vocabulary, and extended our study to reach personal levels by drafting maps of our rooms at home and the classroom. Going cross-curricular, Carrie (Studio instructor) walked the students around Soulard in order to make their own street maps and we have used these maps when we venture out to places in Soulard such as Pontiac Park and The Soulard Market. We also took a special field trip to the Zoo, where we split into two groups and used maps to find each group at a certain meeting spot (under the Sea Lion tunnel). After the Zoo, we wound up eating lunch at the John F. Kennedy pavilion, where we went on a treasure hunt to find yet another map!! We will continue this investigation by researching different animals from the 7 continents and presenting each at a future assembly.

alchemy notes

METEOROLOGISTS | Chief Meteorologists Alchemy Keeping You Informed Alchemy has been exploring weather and climate patterns as well as hazardous events that occur from severe weather. We have discussed the importance of recording these patterns across different times and areas so that predictions can be made about what kind of weather might happen next. We have identified the key elements that meteorologists study—precipitation, wind, and temperature—and what instruments are used to collect data for each of these elements. Our friends will be creating their own rain gauges and anemometers to measure rainfall and wind speed as well as recording daily temperatures for several weeks. We will then use this data to prepare a detailed weather report and compare it to the annual averages for this time of year.

The Alchemists will then research a variety of natural hazards that result from severe weather including thunderstorms, blizzards, hurricanes, tornadoes, and floods. Our friends will then apply what they have learned by teaching a survival class for a weather hazard and designing a safety shelter as protection from this dangerous event!

mums notes

FIVE SENSES | In the Mums classroom, we are exploring our five senses through hands-on experimentation and interactive books and materials. Each of the five senses is tied to a specific part of the body. The ears, eyes, nose, mouth, and hands help us to experience our world. In conjunction with our study of Grossology, we talked about the unpleasantries that go along with each of the sensory parts of the body. We learned that even the gross and embarrassing functions of our body are essential and completely normal, and even quite fascinating. Mucus, commonly referred to in its many forms as boogers, ear wax, and phlegm, may not be suitable for a dinner table conversation, but they work to keep germs and pollutants from entering our bodies. A giant nose, mouth and tongue, and ears are on display in our classroom. We learned about the different ways our senses help keep us out of harm's way and enable us to enjoy the world around us.

We also have discussed Tall Tales and among these, Johnny Appleseed. We will be visiting Mills Apple Farm as a class to learn more about apples, using the same principles of respect for all living things as Johnny Appleseed used. We will be reflecting on our trip by discussing the smells, sounds, sights, tastes and textures of Mills Apple Farm.



studio notes



site-specific ART | The Thrive students have been thinking about and designing artwork that is appropriate for a certain site in the Soulard neighborhood, similar in spirit to the site-specific artwork of Christo/Jeanne-Claude and Andy Goldsworthy. Thrivers are hoping that the lives of both people and animals will be enriched by the sculptures that they have designed. The students have created drawings and models and are currently asking for permission to install these sculptures nearby. Once permission has been granted and supplies secured, students will begin construction.

phys ed notes

The goal of physical education in general terms is for kids to explore a variety of activities and learn to move well so that they develop the knowledge, skills and confidence to become active adults. By using the Missouri Grade Level Expectations and the National Standards for Physical Education, we've been covering standards for general movement, social skills, and sports-related fitness while establishing procedures that keep everyone safe during high energy activities or trips to the field or park.

In PE class during the first trimester, we've been working playing cooperative games to show how everyone can be active and included while working on developing various skills like throwing and catching. Team challenges have included tossing a stuffed animal (or 2 or 3) around a circle without it touching the ground or having blindfolded students navigate a "mine field" by listening to their classmates' directions. We've also explored static and locomotor movements. Younger elementary students practiced skills like skipping while older elementary students worked on their dodging skills. All classes have the format of "warm up, low-high energy, cool down" so they learn to respect their bodies' needs and how to avoid injury.

With the heat finally subsiding, we're spending more time outside. Please make sure children wear proper footwear and clothing on their PE day so they can fully enjoy all our activities.

The children at the Nursery have been exploring the outdoors during this beautiful fall weather. The toddlers explore during walks around Soulard collecting fallen pieces of nature. In the yard we cut down our sunflower stalks and dissected the flowers picking out sunflower seeds. We collected Locust

seed pods from down the street and created music shakers with the seeds. Picking out all of those seeds was a lot of work! Nature has also been brought into the Nursery Studio. The children have created murals painting with leaves, sticks, and anything natural found outside. The babies have also been getting in on the outdoor fun. They spend time outdoors everyday crawling in the grass and pushing around toys on the driveway. Our next big outdoor adventure will be held in two weeks, our annual walk to the Soulard Market for pumpkins.

Students also participated in a rock hunt, nature art creations inspired by Andy Goldsworthy, a park ranger discussion with Ranger Shaw, bat and fish observations on the Meramec River

PERFORMING ARTS & STRINGS INSTRUCTOR


I have been playing and teaching violin for over 20 years. I started learning violin at school in third grade, and love teaching at a school that starts in Kindergarten with the violin. I received a


STUDIO ARTS INSTRUCTOR

When I am not teaching, I enjoy working on my artwork, reading, watching


