Summer Professional Development Opportunities our staff are attending:

- Two intensive week-long workshops with the Litzinger Road Ecology Center entitled "Sustainable School Yards" and "Effective Outdoor Learning"
- One week-long workshop lead by staff at the Opera Theater of Saint Louis called "Music! Words! Opera!"
- Two three-day workshops from the Missouri Botanical Garden called "3-R's" (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle) and "BiodiverseCity: Nature in our Neighborhood" (with a STEM connection)
- Four staff members will attend the Summer Institute for Arts Integration (COCA)
- A three-day workshop that shares how to integrate art into curriculum with the STEAM movement.
- Other short workshops include teaching Handwriting Without Tears curriculum, robotics, and science/math related instruction.



The toddlers have had a blast studying Sea Creatures during our last month of the school year. They especially love learning all about the ocean from our very informative library books, putting together some complex sea puzzles, and creating all kinds of sea creatures during art studio time. The infant classroom space has been remodeled as more and more activity is happening. Along with more space for gross motor activity some daily activity includes trying crayons, sorting shapes and stacking cups (in order). It is very exciting to see all the rapid development and engagement in simple games and songs. Believe it or not the babies, now young toddlers are putting a few toys away in baskets before we transition to outside time. Of course, they are quite motivated to go outside and wait anxiously by the door.



STEAMFest 2014

STEAMfest is our favorite way to end the school year. It is a culminating event that integrates science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics with overall studies from the year. This year, our third annual STEAMfest, entitled "Physics through the Ages", was no exception! Students were grouped into families of mixed ages and rotated through five different experiences. Each letter from STEAM was represented. Staff leading science activities focused on the physics of bubbles; where students made special bubble snake makers and bubble wands.





Our technology group learned about flight and how machines have changed through the ages. Students were encouraged to make their own paper flying machines. Our budding engineers created catapults in even smaller groups; learning from other engineers from the past through video and experimentation.

Did you know that there are many physics concepts behind the creation of the mobile? The arts group tried to balance mobiles using a variety of items found at home and in school. Finally, during the mathematics session, students performed a variety of physics related tasks and added the element of speed to make them even more interesting. Then, the day closed with a catapult competition to see which student made catapult could project a marshmallow the farthest. This event exemplifies our focus on building community, collaboration, and integration.



Alchemy: Plant Predictions

Is it possible to predict what a plant will look like just by making observations about the appearance of its seed? Are there other factors that play a role in a plant's development and life cycle?

The Alchemy class has been investigating these questions during our latest Subject Studies unit about inherited traits of plants and how the environment can affect the traits that develop. We began by making observations about 4 different "mystery herb" seeds (i.e. size, shape, color, texture, etc.) and brainstorming ways to provide ideal growing conditions for our herbs. Our goal was to use the data we recorded over the course of two weeks to figure out what our mystery herbs were—Lemon Basil, Cilantro, Chives, or Curled Parsley.

The Alchemists then had the opportunity to put our deductive skills to the test during our recent visit to Litzsinger Road Ecology Center by studying seeds of native plants and using these astute observations to compare to the grown plants found out in the prairie, woods, and creek! The trip was a success and we may very well have some Gregor Mendel protégés in Alchemy!



The Mosaics: Native American Studies

The Mosaic class spent a great deal of time constructing their own learning about Native Americans. We researched tribes by groups, and created our own non-fiction books to share our learning with others. Topics we focused on included the food tribes ate, what they lived in, how they traveled, artifacts they made, and different jobs of the tribes.

To extend our learning, we traveled to Cahokia Mounds, where students saw re-created villages and tribes. We were able to see the artifacts made by the people who lived in the land and connect it to the learning we had done in the classroom. We had so much fun making the connections, seeing real artifacts and the lifestyle of Native Americans.
