COMING FULL CIRCLE

Circles and spirals are shapes and design elements that have always spoken to me. They represent connectedness and the continuous nature of life and learning. This year we continue to build layers of circles to ensure the school's success at its many levels.

Our first set of circles incorporates old and new. We have always had a strong Parent Association that organizes and supports families, staff and students. Last year, our staff built committees based on the PA's model: Outreach, Social, Documentation and Organizing. This year our students have been brought into the fold. On Monday October 15th during our usual assembly time, students held their first committee meetings. Their committees are based on the framework of essential understandings we use to discuss the school's philosophy with our students. The four student committees are: Gratitude & Empathy; Responsibility & Integrity; Reflection and Philanthropy. Through these circles our students are able to contribute to the larger goals of our school.

A second set of circles that have been set into motion is our Buddy Circles. They are beginning with an eye to new members in our school, as a way to "host" students still getting to know the ropes. The structure for these circles is based on the Circle of Friends approach in which:

"Those in the peer group are encouraged to look at their own behavior and also to develop an understanding of the focus child's behavior and challenges in order to develop strategies and practical solutions to help the individual. It is not an approach to provide instant friendship, but over the course of meetings, it is hoped that the focus child will be able to build closer and better relationships with other children." (Barratt et al).

In future Buddy Circles we hope to support a range of social needs. We know in this circle all members will benefit. Skills practiced will build their social-emotional awareness and will be transferable in other social contexts.

Coming full circle. In all of these groups, committees are overlapping, and spiraling circles whirl around creating the community that connects us. As a tree adds rings each year, we learn ways to broaden our reach into the community, share responsibility and reinforce our commitment to each other.

GREEN EGGS AND HAM

The Mums, Enigma, and Mosaic classes recently went to the St. Louis Symphony, where we heard a variety

of musical styles. Their favorites by far were 'Green Eggs and Ham' and 'Clapping Music'. Clapping Music was written by minimalist



composer Steve Reich, and is performed without instruments. The students were very excited to see this unconventional performance. The concert ended with a musical adaptation of Dr. Seuss's Green Eggs and Ham by Robert Kapilow. The Orchestra provided the music and three singers acted out the book. It was wonderful for the kids to be exposed to musical theatre through a piece with which they are already familiar.

quietude notes

THE SOLAR SYSTEM

The Pre-Kindergarten has been studying our solar system, beginning with the formation of the sun in the Milky Way galaxy. We have learned about Mercury's cold nights, the greenhouse effect on Venus, Earth's yearly orbit of the sun, the two moons (Phobos and Deimos) of Mars and the grand scale of the giant gas planet, Jupiter.

We were inspired by Jupiter's massive size and decided to create our own HUGE JUPITER by collaborating on a large 40" x 56" collage. We each cut, pasted, and painted until our beautiful work was ready to share with the school. A photo of it is on page 1 of this newsletter. You can check it out in person in the hallway!

mosaic notes

The second grade students in the Mosaic room have been learning about some of the **effects the drought** caused this past summer. The students were presented with several options through discussions and overwhelmingly decided to **take care of the**



hummingbirds. We learned that the conditions for pollinating plants were not as available to them as they were preparing for their migration miles and miles away to cross the Gulf of Mexico and onto Central America.

We **investigated** ways to help them. The students **observed** the pond and play area for plants they may be attracted to. We **identified** several and also put up a feeder outside our classroom window. We used tally marks to **document the**

frequency of visitors. Over a three week period we charted 54 sightings. We heard from around the school that many more visitors appeared. It was very exciting. Some

of the interesting facts we learned and experimented with were:

A hummingbird beats its wings 60 to 80 times per second in normal flight:

- We timed ourselves for 60 seconds and found it impossible.


While a hummingbird is at rest, its heart beats about 250 times per minute; while it is in flight, its heart beats about 1,220 times per minute:

 In class we measured our heart rate resting and compared the difference after we did 25 jumping jacks. Although not comparable

to the hummingbird it was a good lesson showing how your heart rate changes with exercise.

The hummingbird study acted as a **bridge to extend learning** opportunities in all the curriculum areas. We finished by returning to the pond to

create rhyming poems.



mums notes

As the weather began to change, the Mums used their five senses to explore the world around them. We first conducted an experiment to identify two unknown substances, finally discovering that they were sugar and salt after tasting the crystals. Then, we focused on each sense with various sensory experiences, such as smelly jars, clean mud, texture blocks, apple taste test, and wind chimes. We concluded our study by taking a walk to the park,

sketching the things

we saw, heard,

smelled, and felt.



These are just a few of the questions Thrive students investigated last month while researching explorers in our class. Students shared this knowledge on Columbus Day during our Explorers of the World Potluck and Presentations.

Thanks to the support of our wonderful parents, this potluck was a huge success featuring presentations from students, tasty foods from around the world, and an opportunity for students to celebrate and share the hard work they put into their research, artifacts, and presentation materials.

As a homework component for this project, several Thrive students created model caravels that represent the ships that many explorers sailed on during The Age of Discovery. Several of these ships are currently on display in the case near the McGurk's room.

LOST IN SPACE!

For the last couple of weeks, our first graders have been lost in space! Lost in the sense of being totally engrossed in the learning process. Our students first showed interest in a nonfiction book about flight and were especially focused on the section with the space shuttle and other space machines. We created a class web together to find out just how much we already knew about space, and discovered our class knows much. But, we had a thirst for more!

We began learning about the **solar system** as a whole, reading many books borrowed from the public library together and summarizing our learning. We participated in activities to help our **brains remember** facts, such as how far are the planets from the sun? We went outside and used found object to help us

representation of the solar system so that we could get a **concrete**representation of how far planets were from the sun. We also explored 3D apps on the iPad as a whole group using the projector. Using this new tool, we know where planets are in our sky and how they **revolve** around the sun in a specific path. From here, we plan to do **partner research** on each of the planets.

Then, we are excited to **expand** our knowledge and create our own planet and solar system in our classroom. Each of our first graders will create their own planet; telling what it is made of, how far it is from the sun, what type of life lives on it, and how the presence of or lack of an **atmosphere** affects life there. Our school year has blasted off with space exploration!

During the past 7 years, The Soulard School has emerged as a leader in education innovation. Thus far, our primary focus has been in developing our own Qualitative Educational (QE) Approach. With confidence, we waited for our first graduates to go out into the world demonstrating the impact our QE Approach has on our students. Not only do our students do very well academically, we consistently hear about their confidence, participation, compassion and creativity. Several schools implore us, "Please send us more of your students!"

Our QE Approach respects children's natural curiosity and puts students in the role of researcher in their own learning. The Soulard School is also a research institution itself. Our Sliding Scale Tuition is the clearest demonstration of this. Despite the resulting \$250,000 annual shortfall, we refuse to sacrifice what is in the best interest of our students. Instead, we ask, "What do children need and how can we make that happen?" Then we make it happen. The entire community is involved. We have heard almost as many comments about the reputation of our unique, committed and extraordinary parents and staff as we have about our students.

This year, a Development Committee of parents, teachers, and administrators has been assembled to ensure our unique school's long-term viability. Erin Quick is working with Kelly Bock as Development Coordinator to organize this committee. Just as the community has built the school; the community will sustain it. Annual Giving

After School Consortium Grant

Did you hear? This year we were awarded \$18,000 through Nonpublic Afterschool Grant! With this we are able to again offer 3 sessions of specialty clubs to the children and families in our community. These clubs serve as an opportunity for our students to try new experiences, practice skills learned during the school day, and build relationships that strengthen community. We are able to offer these clubs at little cost to our families due to the generous funding of the Mental Health Board, the Incarnate Word Foundation, and the Lutheran Foundation of St. Louis. We also owe a big "Thank You!" to Rachel Kryah for all her work to make this possible for the school.

Session 1, an 8-week session that starts the week of October 16, 2012, will run to the week of December 10.

There will be no clubs on November 22nd because of Thanksgiving or the week of November 26 because of TSS conferences.

Session 2 will begin the week of January 7, 2013. Session 3 will begin the week of March 25, 2013.

Along with some of the great returning clubs (acting, chess, and dance) we are offering some new programs this year, culinary arts club, gardening club, sport stacking, and first Lego League, just to name a few.

This grant also gives us an opportunity to add technology to our afterschool program which will help support the clubs as well as provide students in aftercare an opportunity to work on projects and homework. We anticipate being able to begin a Lego Robotic Club next school-year with the computers we will buy this year - so stay tuned for more great opportunities.
