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

looking closely at our values

A messsage from Sarah Christman, School Co-Founder & Executive Director

At the start of the school year, when our staff gathered for the first time, we spent our first moments looking closely at each other. I mean that literally - I asked them to create contour (continuous line) portraits of one another. They had one minute to create their drawings, and were not allowed to look at their papers as they drew, focusing instead on their coworker. That minute for some was awkward, others calm and mostly silly. (The results are displayed on the board right by the front door of the school.) When we came back together as a group we talked about the experience and results. A teacher shared, "I didn't think I'd be good at this." They had tried something new and, "it turned out better than I thought it would." "It wasn't as hard as I thought it would be." "It felt very personal." We took those statements and reflected

day, week, year or couple of years. During the past two pandemic-filled years, the phrase "it turned out better than I thought," has definitely crossed my lips. With a more predictable and philosophically-centered year now underway, we are also in the midst of building a strategic plan that will guide us for the next 3-5 years. This process requires the same close, slightly intense, in-depth look as the contour drawings, but

we are looking at ourselves as a school. The first step in creating a strategic plan is to revisit our mission, vision, purpose and values. To do this, our partners at Gladiator Consulting have met with stakeholders as individuals and groups, and helped us reflect on what is important to us as students, alumni, parents, teachers, board members and leaders.

This year has been full of opportunities to invest in our social emotional learning (SEL) experiences for our students here Classroom teachers work to at TSS. incorporate social emotional lessons into their everyday interactions and lessons in creative ways. Additionally, I am able to come into classrooms each week for a dedicated SEL time block. During these times, students engage in discussions and projects about kindness, friendships, coping strategies, navigating peer conflicts,

and more. Recently, classrooms did an activity in which they were challenged to put toothpaste back into the tube after it had been poured out. Once the students tried and realized it was a challenging and messy task to do, we were able to talk about the experience as a metaphor for friends being unable to take back the "messy" or "sticky" words that they say to others.

Make a Continuous Line Drawing


Tate Kids uses artist Donald Rodney's work to teach about the style and how he used it to bring issues around racial injustice and identity to light.

Items you'll need:

- · Paper to draw on, small is best
- Something to draw with (pen, pencil, crayon - anything will work)
- Something to draw (try your hand, someone's face, or an object from around the house)

Gather your materials. Find a space to work. When you are ready to begin, the trick is to not take your pen off the paper. If you want to add other rules as you draw you can make it a timed drawing. You can also add that you can't look at your paper while drawing, just focus on the object and draw the outline. Repeat as many times as you like and try out different objects!

Our teachers took some time to reflect on a list of values that had been developed from conversations with various stakeholders. What stood out? What was missing? They broke into groups to answer a few questions:

- What does it look like if x value is happening?
- What does it look like if x value is not happening?

This layer of detail is helping us move our values into our priorities and actions. As we wrapped up that conversation each teacher wrote a value that they connected with the most. These words are added to the documentation board at the front door alongside each person's contour portrait.

Our teachers are the number one reason we see a value happening and know what it looks like. They are embodying it, they are sharing it and they are modeling it.



Sprouting in Dramatic Play

One of Jr. Pre-k's favorite centers in our Sprouts classroom is Dramatic Play. Dramatic play can look like trying on costumes, opening restaurants, selling ice cream, having birthday parties, and most recently taking care of babies. Sometimes we would hear our Sprouts friends imitating their teachers and parents in their language during play. Other times the babies were part of complete fantasy play and had superpowers. Not only are the Sprouts building creativity, imaginative play also helps with critical thinking skills, builds expressive and receptive language, increases social skills, allows them to execute self help skills, and work through emotions.

In the Mums Kindergarten class, students' noticings of the environment during their outdoor time led us into an Insect Study in the fall. They had many inquiries about caterpillars and butterflies, such as "How do their wings get their color?", "What is the difference between butterflies and moths?" & "How do caterpillars grow wings?". Together, we researched answers to their questions and discovered new findings through observations of live caterpillars in our classroom. We engaged in a voting process to decide on names for them, and we settled on Pancake, Jeff, Rainbow, Crystal and Dandelion. Students spent time each day investigating them, making predictions, noticing changes, and became deeply engrossed in the happenings within the habitat. Our butterflies finally emerged from their chrysalides, and as a culminating activity, students wrote wishes for our butterflies on their journey ahead.

For the past few months, the Alchemy 2nd grade class has traveled around the world in their imagination and learned about the various Holidays that different people celebrate. Our main goal with this study was to celebrate diversity, as well as encourage our class to see the holiday season from a different perspective. After a long study, the Alchemy class engaged in a variety of crafts from the different holidays we learned about. We made crowns for Saint Lucia's Day, gingerbread houses for German Christmas, Yule logs for Winter Solstice and played dreidel for Hanukkah. Students enjoyed the opportunity to create items from different cultures and share what they learned from this study. The Alchemy students continually demonstrate their ability to have an open mind, and enjoy learning about those who experience life in a different way from them.

In science, the Mosaic 4th grade class has been studying the Earth. We discussed the formation and the age of the Earth by creating a timeline that stretched down the hallway from the front office to the kitchen to visualize the length of time it has been around in comparison to ourselves. Students made several different models of the layers of the Earth and continental drift to help us understand how the planet has been developing over billions of years.

They created clay models that show the layers of the Earth: the core, the mantle, and the crust. Paper models show their understanding of continental drift and our interpretation of Pangea, the supercontinent that existed long ago.

In December, we began our Volleying/Striking Unit in all PE classes. Students practiced volleying and striking balloons and soft rubber balls while participating in various activities that focused on consecutive hits and accuracy. Students had the opportunity to work independently and also with their peers as they developed their skills over the course of several weeks. While working with their peers, students were encouraged to be a buddy by exhibiting respectful and kind words and actions. Students in the Mosaic (4th grade) class worked with their station partner to design and create their own "net" to practice their volleying and striking. They had a variety of equipment available for their use in this project, and they were able to use as much or as little equipment as they wanted. Since we do not currently have a volleyball net, it was an awesome way to show students that although the equipment may not always be available, these skills can still be practiced and developed with the resources that we do have.

We are growing together -- in our skills, our creative thinking, and as teammates!

This year, we were excited to take our partnership a step further, and invite the band into the Strings and Performing Arts classroom for a residency in December.

All elementary students had a chance to work with the musicians: while the primary grades enjoyed Irish jig classes with Marty, other classes got the opportunity to learn basic mandolin skills with Brian. The band members also coached the students on vocal technique as well as tips for stage presence, and answered many questions about their music and life as touring musicians.

One of the most popular lunches at the Soulard School is Mac & Cheese. We usually serve it with a green vegetable, fresh fruit, and salad on the side. The key to making a smooth cheese sauce is the roux: the mixture of butter and flour that is lightly browned before adding milk to thicken it up. Every Culinary Arts Instructor has had their own spin on this basic recipe.

Here's how Sarah Kate makes hers!

Ingredients:

- 16oz box of Elbow Macaroni
- ¼ cup (½ stick) of butter
- 1/4 cup flour
- 2 cups whole milk
- 4oz (½ package) cream cheese
- 2 cups shredded cheddar jack cheese
- ¼ teaspoon of turmeric powder
- ½ teaspoon of garlic powder
- ½ teaspoon of smoked paprika
- 1/4 teaspoon of salt
- Ground black pepper to taste



Directions:

- Cook the elbow macaroni according to the instructions on the box. Drain, cover and set aside.
- In a large sauce pan or skillet melt the butter over low heat. Add in the flour and stir with a whisk until it turns the color of a cashew and thickens to a paste.
- Slowly add ½ cup milk, whisking constantly. When it thickens, add more milk and continue stirring until all milk is incorporated and mixture is smooth and bubbling.
- Fold in the cream cheese, stir with a rubber spatula until completely smooth.
- Fold in the cheddar jack cheese, stir with a rubber spatula until completely smooth.
- Stir in turmeric, garlic powder, smoked paprika, salt and pepper.
- Combine with pasta and stir until coated.

Variations: 16oz box of any pasta can be substituted.




