
## A COMMUNITY DEVOTED

### MUMS AND THE VERTEBRATES

We noticed an interest in animal groupings as students began to sort animals and build out their habitats during our free choice exploration. This became a recurring theme in their play; we observed and listened as other students began to join and discuss the groupings. We began our study with two main groups: vertebrates and invertebrates.

We learned that while the majority of the Earth's creatures are invertebrates, most animals that we know and love are vertebrates. From there, we studied each group of vertebrates more in depth. We began with reptiles, then moved to amphibians, mammals, birds, and finally, fish.

To deepen our understanding of what the word vertebrate means, we looked at x-rays of animals to see what their skeletons looked like. Students studied the skeletons and were eager to guess which creatures each skeleton belonged to. After we studied each animal group, we engaged in a guided drawing to create an illustration of an animal from that specific group and drew 4 qualities that helped us to understand what makes each animal group unique. As a culminating activity of our study, we plan to have each student compile their work and create a book of vertebrates.



In Enigma, we have been learning about Indigenous Peoples. We've read nonfiction texts together to identify text features, watched videos and recorded the important information we learned. We mapped vocabulary words and took notes about our learning to build our knowledge. We read the story, Fry Bread, which helped us understand how food is an important part of culture and keeping traditions alive. We then got to make and eat fry bread with Sarah Kate in Culinary Arts!

We read the story, We Are Water Protectors, by Carole Lindstrom. We admired the beautiful watercolor illustrations and discussed how water is essential to life. We discussed how Indigenous cultures settle around bodies of water because it's necessary to fuel all living things. We learned about oil pipelines (called "the black snake") and how they threaten land rights and ecosystems. We watched videos about the oil refining process to understand the gravity of its devastation across the country and illustrated our learning in watercolor paintings. We learned about an Indigenous and youth-led protest at Standing Rock which aimed to stop building the Dakota Access Pipeline. This inspired us to make our own protest posters.

We researched which tribes formerly lived in the St. Louis area, and we learned two major tribes were the Osage and the Kickapoo. Enigma connected with our 5th grade Explorers friends who have been learning about the Osage tribe and Water Protectors. We partnered with Explorers in a science experiment where we tried to use various tools to help clean water that had been "polluted" with food coloring, wood chips, leaves and plastic waste. This led us to understand how hard it is to clean water once it's polluted. We reflected on what worked best and how we can make a change through protesting, contacting government officials, and voting for people who will stand up for what's right.

### Martin Luther King Jr. + Thrive have a Dream ...

Coming back from Winter Break, Thrive began a study of civil rights and Martin Luther King Jr. Students watched short video clips highlighting and detailing MLK's life. Students also read parts of MLK's "I have a Dream" speech. This led us to discuss not "What do we want to be when we grow up," but rather "What problems do we want to solve or help solve as we get older?' Once we changed the question, students' minds began to explore the endless possibilities and they started looking at the bigger picture, just as MLK did. Students expressed their love for others and the environment, their hopes to stop pollution, and their wish to help others with limited resources. All of this led to a hallway display board in which the students wrote about their dreams.

Our hope as educators is that we allow our students to explore and think outside of the box, we encourage their minds to flourish and dream of the impossible. We all have dreams that may seem far off, distant, or maybe even unattainable - but sometimes we just need the right people to come along to cheer us on. MLK had a dream - what about you?



#### THE LESSON

We began our study with a video on the biography of Vincent Van Gogh. 1st grade Enigma then compared and contrasted the colors and mood of his first painting and his later, most famous work, Starry Night. Students noticed how sad the mood in the first image was, and the lack of bright colors. They made connections to how Van Gogh's emotions affected his art and how when he sought help for feeling depressed, his paintings became a lot different.

#### THE PROCESS

Students first drew designs in yellow paint that they then printed onto their paper. Printmaking is different from painting in that you lay your paper onto a design or material and the impression is copied onto the paper. After the yellow dried, they printed a blue design on their paper. When all of the paint was dry they cut out houses and trees from black construction paper and decorated them using oil pastels. Although this process is different from how Van Gogh painted with oil paint, it replicates the Impressionist feel of creating art.

#### THE OBJECTIVE

The goal of the lesson was to be able to identify the painting Starry Night and also discuss how emotions and certain elements of art, such as color, affect the mood of an artwork.

#### MADE WITH LOVE



Our Explorers 5th grade class began 2024 with Baking Bootcamp, a crash course in cooking up delicious baked goods that culminated in students working in groups to make cookies, scones and muffins for our Open House for Prospective Families in January.

The class spent their Culinary Arts lessons studying the chemistry of baking; applying multiplication, division and fraction math skills to adjust recipes; and using their social-emotional skills to work together and delegate tasks to create delicious treats.



Here is our adapted Gingersnap Cookie recipe, which we served to our guests at Open House.



#### Dry Ingredients:

- 4 Cups All Purpose Flour
- 4 tsp Baking Soda
- 1 tsp Salt
- 2 tsp Cinnamon
- 1 Tbs Ground Ginger
- 1 Tbs Groud Cloves

#### Wet Ingredients:

- 3 sticks (1 ½ Cups) Unsalted Butter, Softened
- 2 Cups Granulated Sugar
- 2 Eggs
- 1/2 Cup Blackstrap Molasses

#### Final Ingredients:

- 1 Cup Granulated Sugar
- Cooking Spray
- **Drinking Glass**

#### Directions:

Heat oven to 350. Line baking sheets with parchment

Combine dry ingredients in a large mixing bowl and set aside

Beat butter and granulated sugar until light fluffy and pale in color.

Add eggs, beat until smooth.

Beat in half of the dry mixture until smooth, then scrape the sides of the bowl.

Beat in the molasses until smooth, then scrape the sides of the bowl.

Beat in the rest of the dry ingredients until smooth.

Form into 1 inch balls, roll in finishing sugar and place on parchment-covered baking sheets about 2 inches apart.

Spray bottom of a glass with cooking spray, dip in finishing sugar and flatten the balls into disks about 1/4 inch thick.

Bake at 350 for 15-20 minutes, cool on a wire rack.
